

- 1922 Wm Fitzsimmons, electro-plater; Sidney S. Smith, no occupation (dir).
- 1923 Sidney S. Smith files for a patent on a mouthpiece with an adjustable rim (photo 1).
- 1925 Smith granted patent #1,556,729 for mouthpiece in Oct.
- 1930 Sidney Smith, musical instrument manuf., #53 Ransom (census). SS Smith Mfg Co, 53 Ransom Ave (International Musician ad below).



- 19?? One mouthpiece owner says he worked with Jim Fitzsimmons, a former York employee, who went bankrupt making the mouthpieces and later worked at Bill Johnson's Musical Exchange (HUC).

The only James Fitzsimmons found in the GR directory spent his life as a spring maker for a mattress company and never worked for York so perhaps William used "Jim" as a nickname.

Fitzsimmons is spelled with either one or two "m"s so I have left the spellings as shown in the references.

Most of the addresses given seem to be residences.
