- 1909 Louis B. Malecki & Co. was recently incorporated as a NJ company, #204 Wabash Ave, Chicago, \$16,000 capital.
- 1910 In census as a music merchant.
- 1911 Now at #272 Wabash Ave, owned by Carl Fischer with Louis Malecki as agent (directory).
- 1911 Now at #337 S. Wabash Ave (dir).
- 1913 #337 S. Wabash Ave, owned by Carl Fischer, Walter Fischer secretary, Louis Malecki agent (dir).
- 1915 #337 S. Wabash Ave, now moving to the 2nd floor from their old store on the 1st floor, wholesale & retail dealer in band instruments; Carl Fischer representative.
- 1920 In census as manager of music house; living in Oak Park.
- 1930 In census as music department manager. Son James Aloyeius Malecki (1905-1997) is a clerk there. Both are living at #848 Kenilworth Ave, Oak Park, IL.
- 1940 Louis B. Malecki & Son, 43 Ionia Ave., NW Grand Rapids.
- 1947 Louis dies on January 18th in Grand Rapids, MI. Louis B. Malecki & Son is a music store at #129-1/2 Ottawa St. in NW Grand Rapids. They were to exhibit at the U. of Mich. in January 1948 (*MTR*).
- 1961 Malecki Music House, #129-1/2 Ottawa St.
- 1966 Malecki Music House, #2040 Division.
- 1968 Malecki Music Co., #2040 Division Ave. S., Grand Rapids.
- 1997 Son James dies at 92; former owner of Malecki Music Co.
- 1999 Carl Fischer closes their Chicago store at #312 S. Wabash.
- 2004 Malecki Music Co is acquired by J. W. Pepper.
- 2016 Malecki Music Inc., #4500 Broadmoor Ave SE, Grand Rapids; a division of J.W. Pepper; may be closing.
